

- Read every day. Parents, read to your kids, with your kids, listen to them read. Read comics and picture books and that book you loved when you were a kid. And when you need some time to yourself, turn on an audiobook - those count too.
- Play board games and card games. Play hide and seek and football in the garden. Have Lego competitions.
- Write letters to grandparents and diary entries documenting your days.
- Go on a hike. Stay up late and look at the stars. Plant a garden. Dig up worms. Draw the leaves and flowers and bugs you find.
- Be creative. Make stop motion videos. Watch BBC earth movies and plan an imaginary trip. Discover a new hobby... or resurrect an old one. Order some wool and learn to finger knit. Paint pictures. Bake bread. They won't fall behind or stop learning.
- Yes, you might have to guide your kids in some virtual learning. This is your chance to let your kids do the things that get them excited... building forts, designing robots, baking muffins. This is your chance to help them see learning as something that happens ALL DAY LONG, in everything we do. Not just in textbooks and classrooms.
