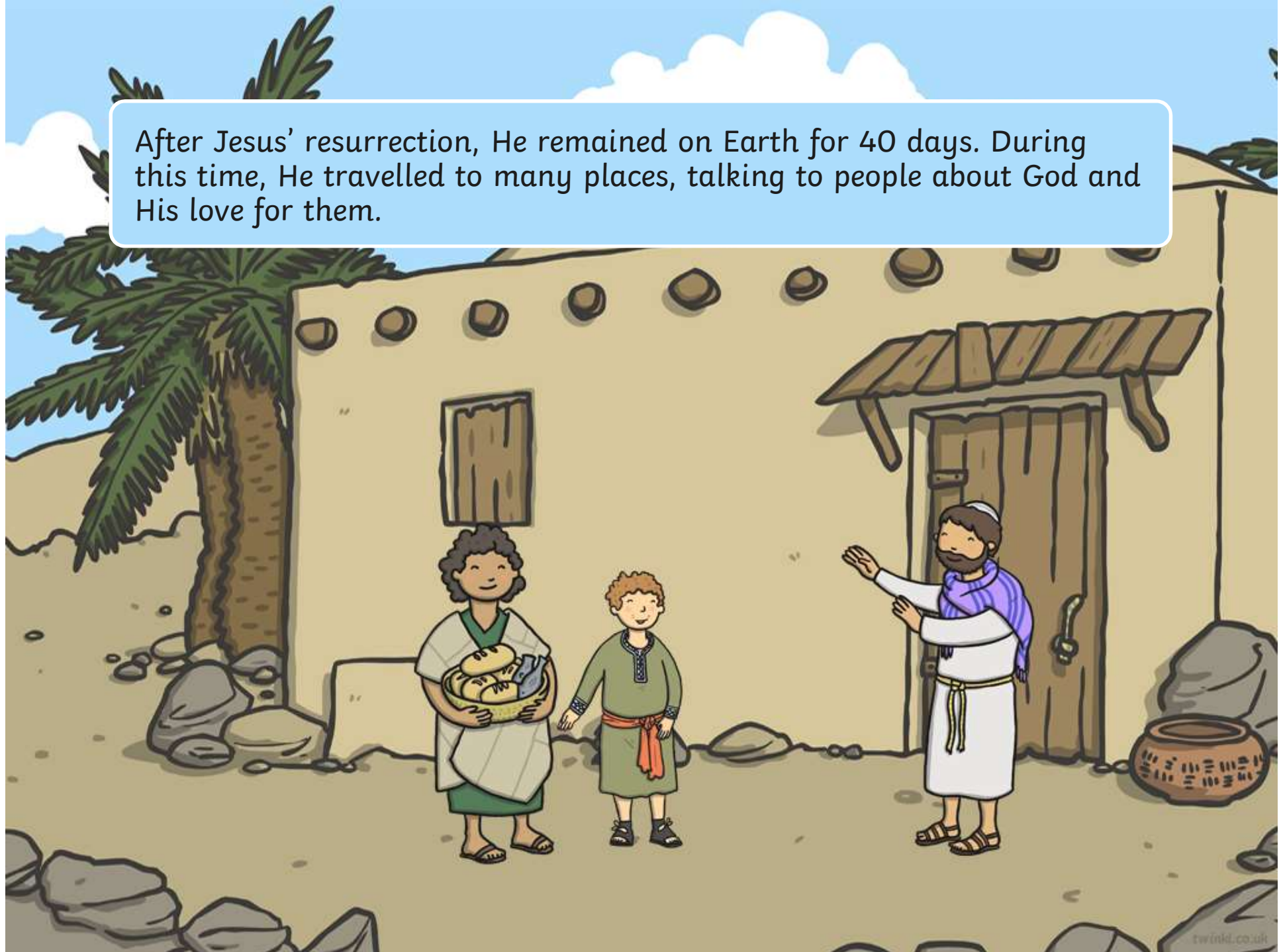
Pentecost

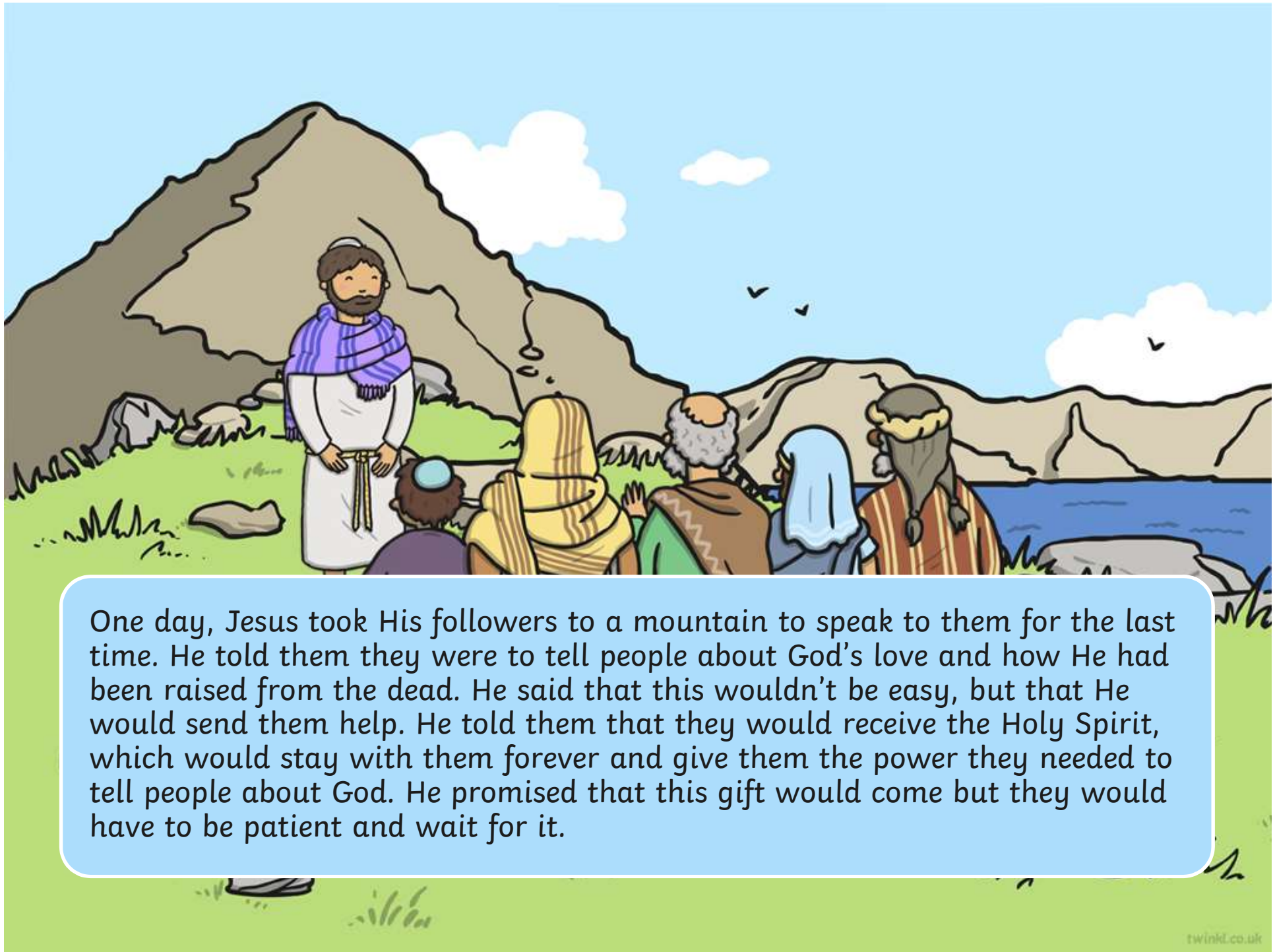
Pentecost is celebrated 50 days after Easter Sunday (this is when Jesus was resurrected). It is a happy time in the Christian calendar. It is thought of as the birthday of the Christian Church.

After Jesus' resurrection, He remained on Earth for 40 days. During this time, He travelled to many places, talking to people about God and His love for them.






One day, Jesus took His followers to a mountain to speak to them for the last time. He told them they were to tell people about God's love and how He had been raised from the dead. He said that this wouldn't be easy, but that He would send them help. He told them that they would receive the Holy Spirit, which would stay with them forever and give them the power they needed to tell people about God. He promised that this gift would come but they would have to be patient and wait for it.



After He had finished speaking, Jesus was taken up to Heaven. He had ascended.

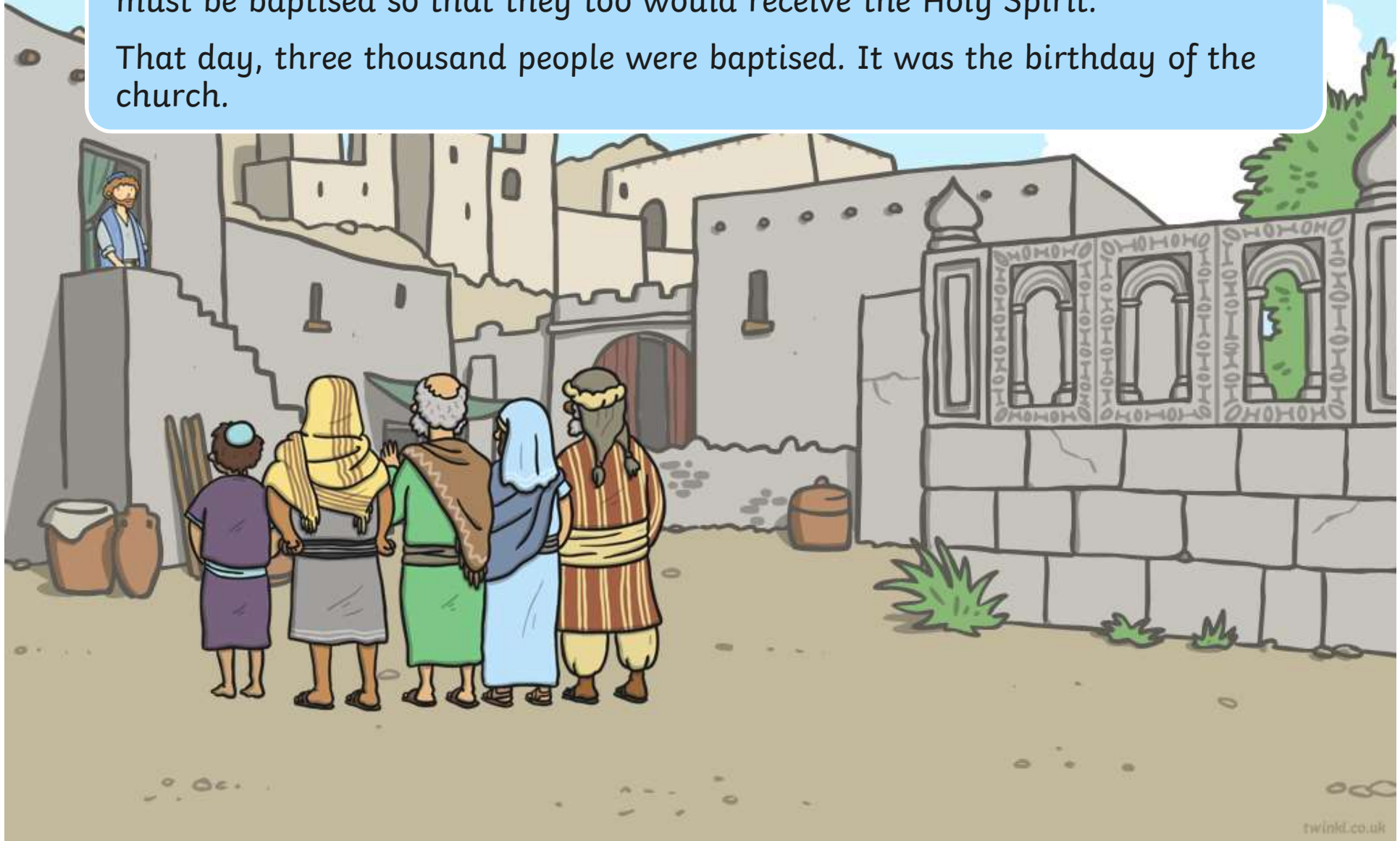
The tongues of the flames separated and came to rest above each of their heads. The disciples were filled with the Holy Spirit and they began to speak in different languages, although they had never learned them!

Symbols of Pentecost

Christians believe that they receive the Holy Spirit when they accept Christ and become Christians. They believe that the Holy Spirit never leaves them and therefore, God never leaves them.

They believe that the Holy Spirit teaches them, comforts them and helps them to do the right thing.

During Pentecost, red is used in the church and often, the ministers will wear red. The symbol of the flames that appeared above the disciples' heads will also be seen.

Sometimes the symbol of the dove is used to represent the Holy Spirit. This is because earlier in Jesus' life, when He was baptised, a dove brought the Holy Spirit to Jesus.
